






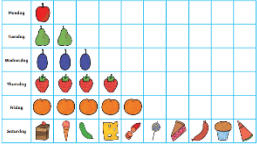





Year R Home Learning (Amazing Animals)

<p>Eric Carle is the author of the Very Hungry Caterpillar story! His books have amazing pictures of animals. Can you make a picture of an animal in the design of Eric Carle? Can you use more than one media?</p> 	<p>Can you play a game of 'Guess the Minibeast' with a member of your family? For example, you might say... -I am long and live in the mud. What am I? -I am yellow and black and buzz. What am I?</p> 	<p>Minibeasts have wonderful patterns on them if you look closely! Can you draw a minibeast, paying extra attention to the detail? Do you notice any spots, swirls, lines or even repeating patterns?</p> 
<p>Can you make your own Very Hungry Caterpillar paper chain? All you need is paper, glue, scissors and pens! See if you can give him a face and maybe even lots of little legs!</p> 	<p>Can you make up your own story based on The Very Hungry Caterpillar? Could you change what the caterpillar eats every day? What are your favourite foods? Could you re-write the story? You could make a flip book of your own story?</p> 	<p>Can you prepare a healthy snack using some of the food from 'The Very Hungry Caterpillar?' Maybe you could make a strawberry smoothie, a fruit kebab or a cheese, pickle and salami sandwich!</p> 
<p>There are so many minibeasts that live outdoors, do you think you could go on a minibeast hunt?</p>  <p>Can you find a caterpillar, a butterfly or a worm? (see chart below)</p>	<p>Can you make a chart using the resources of how much The Hungry Caterpillar has eaten? What is the total of each food?</p> 	<p>Butterflies have wings that are symmetrical - which means that both sides of the butterfly are exactly the SAME. Could you have a go at using the template to create your own butterfly.</p> 



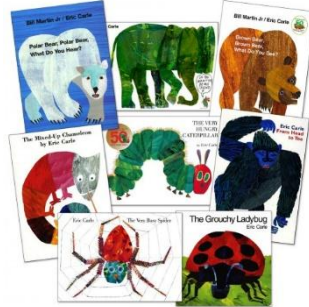
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This sheet contains suggested activities for home Learning this week. It is not an expectation that all activities are completed.

Have a go at phase 2 and if you are enjoying that you can have a go at phase 3 and put on your phonic hat to help you 😊

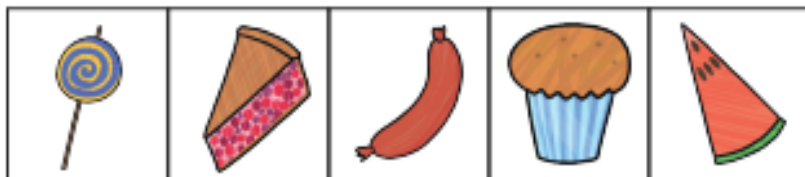
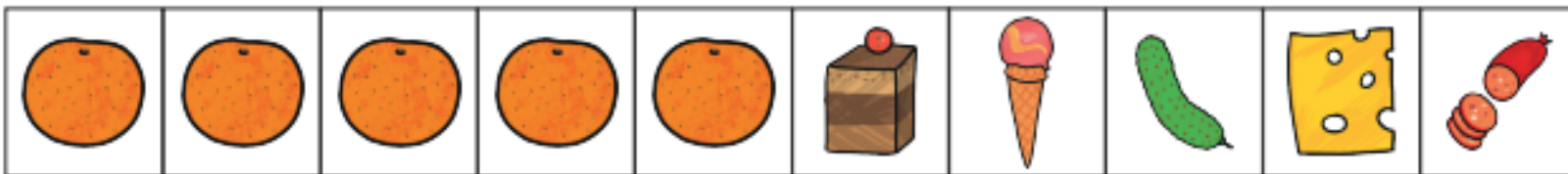
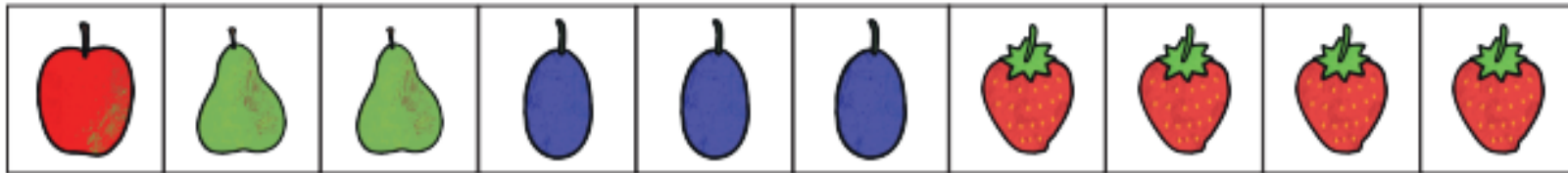




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The Very Hungry Caterpillar Graph
